Mountain Dulcimer Music Fest 2025 Workshop Leaders

Carolyn Brodginski was a quick study when she finally got her hands on a mountain dulcimer after four decades playing guitar. The sweet sound, and many voices of the dulcimer opened a new musical world and opportunities. It wasn't long before the dulcimer was integrated into the sound of her band, and she began teaching privately, at festivals, and at St. Francis Hospital where she worked as a therapeutic musician from 2015 until Covid hit in March of 2020. But Covid didn't slow her down. Carolyn has been a regular song leader, and two-time mystery guest in Pat Clark's weekly "Send In The Music" jam since March of 2020. She also used all that free time to master another stringed instrument, the Celtic harp. An award-winning singer/songwriter, four of her original songs have been featured in the music sampler of Dulcimer Players News, including her latest song, "Sherry's Diamonds", a harp/dulcimer duet, which was in the August 2022 edition. www.carolynbrodginski.com





Sam Edelston comes to mountain dulcimers from the direction of chords, songs, and popular music (similar to how most people learn the guitar). He's on a mission to bring dulcimers to the general public through songs they already love in genres like rock, pop, folk, blues, country, and even jazz and classical music. His online videos have been viewed over 1,000,000 times, in over 190 countries. Sam chairs the Nutmeg Dulcimer Festival, held every fall in Milford, CT. He's performed or taught at numerous folk festivals, dulcimer festivals (including MDMF many times), and other venues in the Northeast and across the country, as well as QuaranTUNE and other online festivals. This year marks his 20th year as the New York State American Legion Boys' State Program Band Director. Mack Johnston is a graduate of the Dulcimer University/ Western Carolina University certification program in teaching Mountain Dulcimer and teaches private students, classes and festival workshops in the New England and North Carolina regions. In addition to the dulcimer, Mack plays mandolin and guitar. He and his wife Melanie have 15 years' experience with founding and directing dulcimer orchestras: the Northeast Dulcimer Orchestra (2009-2014), the Asheville Dulcimer Orchestra (2016 – present). They perform on dulcimer, guitar and mandolin in the Asheville area as Heartstrings, and with the Arbor Trio at the North Carolina Arboretum. Together they have written *Dulcimer Jam Training Wheels*. The book contains quarter note versions of many popular jam tunes





Melanie Johnston has been playing Mountain Dulcimer since 2001. She and her husband Mack co-founded the Northeast Dulcimer Orchestra and the Connecticut Mountain Dulcimer Gathering. Since moving to Asheville. NC in 2017, they have had extensive teaching and performing experience and have founded the Black Bear Dulcimer Gathering and the Asheville Dulcimer Orchestra. Melanie is a graduate of the Dulcimer University/Western Carolina University certification program for teaching the Mountain Dulcimer. She teaches private students, classes and festival workshops in the New England, New York and North Carolina regions and virtual. In addition to playing and teaching dulcimer, Melanie has written TablEdit for Mountain Dulcimer Arrangers, Dulcimer Jam Training Wheels and Catskill Mountain Waltzes and Airs, available through Folkcraft Instruments.

Lori Keddell has been playing the dulcimer since 1985, and has taught classes and workshops for both children and adults in building and playing cardboard dulcimers. She was instrumental in organizing our first MDMF in 1989, and has been the coordinator since 1991. She was on the staff of the Cranberry Dulcimer and Autoharp Gathering from 1987 to 2016, and has been an instructor at numerous festivals in New York, VT, MA, PA and CT. With George Haggerty, she taught a week-long Dulcimer Elderhostel class in Vermont for many years. She has published 5 books of arrangements for the mountain dulcimer, each with an accompanying CD. Her newest book, "Lullabies and Night Songs for the Mountain Dulcimer" contains 78 lullabies from around the world. She has also contributed many pieces of music to the monthly newsletter of the Dulcimer Association of Albany.





Bonnie Leigh, CMP - a Certified Music Practitioner, performer/teacher and singer/songwriter, actively performs and teaches her gentle style of playing with the mountain dulcimer across the northeast coast. Bonnie has taught at eleven dulcimer festivals across the east and has been giving lessons, teaching at festivals and performing since 1991. You would find her at historical villages, libraries, clubs, meetings, coffeehouses and nursing homes. Her easy manner makes learning to play fun and relaxed. As a Music Practitioner Bonnie would play the dulcimer and small harp at the bedside of hospice patients. Bonnie and Ellen Pratt are the cocoordinators of the New England Dulcimer Days in West Dover, VT. As a songwriter, Bonnie's original songs can be found on her 3 recordings all with accompanying dulcimer tab songbooks. Ellen Pratt has been playing dulcimer for twenty-four years. She began writing her own music in 2004. Lucy Joan Sollogub has been enjoying playing, teaching, performing and arranging with the mountain dulcimer for at least 5 decades! She feels very fortunate to have learned to play with 2 wonderful musicians and teachers; Lorraine Hammond and Leo Kretzner. In the "old days" of dulcimer playing, when we didn't have capos, 6½ frets, 1½ frets etc., we needed to re-tune to play in minor keys, and play in different keys and modalities. Lucy feels quite fortunate that she experienced this way of playing dulcimer, and utilizes these different modal tunings frequently. Currently Lucy teaches dulcimer, recorder, tin whistle and lever harp to people of all ages in two music schools in Massachusetts. Lucy also performs regularly with the New England Irish Harp Orchestra which has many concerts throughout the year. Lucy has been a featured performer at the Mountain Dulcimer Music Fest, the Cranberry Dulcimer Gathering, and the August Dulcimer Daze festival and is thrilled to be at MDMF this year.



Carol Walker's formal training includes a degree in Music Education, with majors in piano, harp, and voice. She retired after 32 years as an active high school choral teacher (and was the recipient of the 2003 NJ Governor's Teacher of the Year Award), but soon found a way to combine her love of teaching with her new direction in folk music, and has become a popular workshop leader and featured performer at festivals all over the US, plus QuaranTUNE Virtual Festival. 
